particular heirloom varieties are available for sharing. Members are then free to contact each other and share seeds and growing information freely, without the need of a middle-person.

Seeds of Diversity also has a long-standing cooperative partnership with Plant Gene Resources of Canada (PGRC), the federal seed bank located in Saskatoon. PGRC gives non-proprietary vegetable and grain seeds to Seeds of Diversity members to grow in their own gardens. Members return fresh seed to the federal bank for storage and can keep some for themselves. They record observations of yield, quality, disease resistance etc. and submit the information for inclusion in PGRC's publicly accessible online database. Patrizia points out that the regular rejuvenation of these seeds is extremely important, especially because it gives them the opportunity to adapt to ongoing climatic changes which wouldn't happen being stored on a shelf. Seeds of Diversity also now has their own online heritage varieties database with descriptions, stories, history, cultivation details, and member gardeners' comments on 18957 different cultivars of Canadian garden vegetables, fruit, grains and ornamentals. Coastal Alliance for Aquaculture Reform (CAAR)

The individual organizations that have allied under the banner of CAAR have been working on aquaculture reform, protection of wild salmon, marine habitat protection and other related issues on the west coast of Canada for many years, for some as many as fifteen years. Often working together informally, they had built strong working relationships and a foundation of mutual respect. Now collaborating together in a concerted strategic capacity, the members of the alliance are actively working towards changes that will make the salmon farming industry safer for humans and the environment. Members include: David Suzuki Foundation, Living Oceans Society, Georgia Strait Alliance, BC Aboriginal Fisheries Commission, Friends of Clayoquot Sound, T. Buck Suzuki Environmental Foundation, Watershed Watch Society, Raincoast Conservation Society, The Musgamagw Tsawataineuk Tribal Council, Raincoast Research, and Society Promoting Environmental Conservation.

For many years activists, biologists, first nations, commercial fishers, and other community groups have voiced concerns about open net salmon farming off BC's coast. Concerns range from the impact of escaped Atlantic salmon on wild Pacific salmon health, disease transfer between farmed and wild stocks, the economic impact of cheap farmed salmon on the wild salmon commercial fishery, the pollution of the marine environment from farm effluent and toxic industrial chemicals, and human health concerns from fish regularly treated with antibiotics. In April 2002, the seven year old provincial moratorium on the expansion of fish farms was lifted, giving the green light to rapid expansion of the industry despite persistent concerns.

Predicting this outcome in 2000, concerned organizations started meeting regularly to develop a coordinated strategy to advance the body of scientific research on salmon aquaculture, inform the public and policymakers about the risks of open-net farming and potential solutions for moving towards safer methods, and support the players in the industry who work towards improving their operations. A targeted planning grant from a dedicated funder made it possible to do what geographic dispersion and the groups' limited individual funding would never have allowed: to meet in person once a month to build a strong and harmonious alliance and an effective strategy for positive change.
